## The Chapel of the White Penitents

It is a simple building with a single nave, remarkable for its beautiful, classical facade (XVIth- XVIIth century, the chapel is covered with a full arched vault dominating a slightly raised choir and a nave with three bays.

It houses, in the choir behind a sarcophagus-shaped altar, a monumental baroque altarpiece of the Transfiguration (circa 1620). The painting is framed by twisted columns supporting an entablature with foliated scrolls and a scrolled pediment. In the bays you can see a Saint Thomas of Villeneuve (circa 1680) painted for the Augustins by Jean-André of Castellane and an anonymous painting dedicated to the cult of the sacred heart.

Two brotherhoods of Penitents existed, one black and one white before they joined together to form the Penitents of the Miséricorde (*Mercy*). Wearing white robes with a black cord, they took part in numerous solemn parish processions, helped with burials and the administration of the Parish Granary. This brotherhood which had 60 members in 1808, finally disappeared in the 20<sup>th</sup> century due to a lack of recruitment.
